The Battle of Naseby was fought in June 1645 during the First English Civil War. Sir Thomas Fairfax, Captain-General of Parliament's New Model Army, led his troops to victory over King Charles I.

Key facts

- Soldiers on both sides were largely inexperienced
- The two sides involved were the Royalists and Parliamentarians
- The Royalists were led by King Charles I
- The Parliamentarians were commanded by Sir Thomas Fairfax

1625

Charles I becomes King

1629

Parliament is dissolved for 11 years

1642

War is declared

1643

Battle of Naseby takes place. A victory for parliament

1647

Charles handed over to parliament
