Maths: Fractions



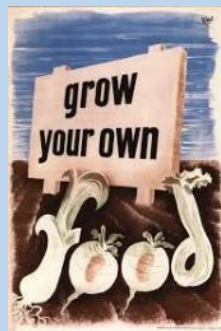
We will mainly be focussing on fractions this term. We actually use fractions a lot, probably without realising it!. How many examples can you come up with where we use fractions in everyday life?
